Report of the Trustee as of December 31, 2006

General

During the second quarter of 2003 the CST received \$254,000 in donor-directed funds to be used for ecosystem based management (EBM) related land use planning in the Trust area. During the second quarter of 2004 the CST received \$145,000 in donor-directed funds to be used for Economic, Scientific and Adaptive Management Development and Planning (ESAMDAP). After allowing for those separate accounts, income to date from investments of the CST has exceeded total administration expenses by over \$2,250,000. It is now clear there will be no need to use any of the capital of the Trust to fund its administration. This will allow over \$3.2 million more than originally planned to go to beneficiaries.

Mitigation Fund Account

During the life of the Mitigation Fund, payments totaling \$2.93 million were made to 182 redundant workers. The average severance per employee was \$16,120. In addition, payments totaling \$10.75 million were made to mitigate the holders of 46 contracts that were reduced or eliminated because of provincial government land use decisions related to the Land and Resource Management Plan process on the Central Coast.

In every case the distributions to workers and contractors satisfied a Distribution Objective of the Deed of Trust that established the CST. In particular, these payments met the requirement that "The distribution will assist in mitigating any adverse effect suffered by Workers, Contractors and other Beneficiaries as a result of provincial government land use decisions made in respect of the Specified Area." Each of the workers and contractors met the above test in that the workers all suffered a loss of employment, and the contractors all suffered a loss of contractual rights.

The distribution from the Mitigation Fund is now complete. As required by the Trust Deed that created the CST, all funds remaining in the Mitigation Account after March 31, 2005 were rolled in to the Community Matching Fund Account. Therefore, as of April 1, 2005, \$12,258,170 was rolled into the Matching Fund, and the Mitigation Fund was closed.

With recent developments on the North Coast and the Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii, there has been some concern expressed by affected individuals that the Mitigation Fund no longer exists, and a wish has been expressed that it be recreated. However, legal advice received by the Trustee indicates that it is not possible to take funds from the Matching Fund, whose beneficiaries are primarily communities and First Nations, or not for profit entities supported by them, in order to give them to a different group of beneficiaries, being workers and contractors. In addition, the matching fund requires that beneficiaries receive at least an equal amount of unencumbered funds from a source other that the CST. Therefore, funds could not flow from the matching fund to a new mitigation fund unless matching funds were found for the mitigation fund. If matching funds are found, and the beneficiaries of the Mitigation Funds experienced their loss as a consequence of the implementation of Ecosystem Based Management (EBM), then it would be possible to create a new Mitigation Fund using some or all of the \$5,000,000 currently set aside for mitigating the negative effects of the implementation of EBM on workers, contractors and communities.

Community Matching Fund Account

When the CST Community Matching Fund started operations, the Advisory Board agreed that decisions related to specific initiatives in the communities should be made at the local level as opposed to by the broader Advisory Board. Five Regional Steering Committees (RSCs) were formed. They are Comox Strathcona, Mount Waddington, the Central Coast, the North Coast, and Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii. All five Regional Steering Committees are now operational. Significant progress has been made to date with four of the five RSCs. Formation of the Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii (QCI-HG) RSC was delayed because there had been limited progress with the QCI-HG Land Use Planning (LUP) process. The QCI-HG-LUP Table has now completed its work, the QCI-HG - RSC has been activated with the appointment of two civic community and two Haida representatives, and 11 projects have been approved for funding.

Leverage of CST Matching Funds

Each of the five RSCs has been allocated \$3,500,000 to use towards developing Regional Economic Development Strategies and to support individual initiatives that fit those strategies. As of the end of December 31, 2006, funding has been approved for a total of 144 projects. The total commitment from the CST is \$8,998,692, for projects worth a total of \$74,208,616. Therefore, on average a total of \$8.20 goes into approved projects for each \$1.00 of CST funds committed.

Following is a table that shows the total value of the requests for assistance, and the progress in approving funding for each of the RSCs. As of December 31, 2006, Funding Agreements were being negotiated with proponents of many of the approved projects. The version of this report on the CST website (www.coastsustainabilitytrust.com) includes a schedule listing all the approved projects, including a short description for each of them.

Types of Projects being approved

Four active RSCs have determined what their strategic priorities are. The Central Coast Regional District has completed its Economic Development Operating Plan, and posted it on its website. The North Coast is making progress in developing a North Coast Economic and Community Development Plan. The Regional District of Comox Strathcona has developed a Comox Strathcona Regional Economic Development Strategy, and the Regional District of Mount Waddington (RDMW) has developed a RDMW Economic Development Plan. The Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii Regional Steering Committee has not developed strategic priorities as they are deferring to a process under way as a continuation of the LUP process. For the moment, they have elected to use their discretion and knowledge of local issues to evaluate applications. Only ones that clearly fit the general priorities on the Islands will be approved.

In order to stimulate activity, each RSC considers and approves projects that fit into the strategic priorities of their area or, if no formal strategic priorities have been developed, projects that clearly fall into the range of initiatives that will be included. The types of projects vary to some extent by the chosen strategic direction of each RSC. In each RSC the highest concentration of project approvals relate to the enhancement of tourism opportunities, with an emphasis on eco and cultural tourism. Examples are the construction or renovation of First Nations Big Houses, support for tourism associations on the Central Coast, on northern Vancouver Island and on the Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii, assistance to the Nisga'a in Prince Rupert for the "Nisga'a Experience" project, assistance to the Haida in the construction of a cultural center, assistance to the Kwakiutl in a resort upgrade, assistance to the Bella Coola Valley Museum, to help make it an even better attraction, funding for self directed walking tours in Campbell River and the Comox Valley, and Bear watching operations in Phillips Arm for the Kwiakah First Nation , and in the Chuckwalla Nature Sanctuary for the Oweekeno First Nation. In aggregate, 50% of CST funding has gone to assist tourism related projects.

Infrastructure improvements are another primary focus. Some are aimed at enhancing tourism, such as creating or improving destination hiking or mountain biking trails, construction of RV and Campground facilities, construction of an all season all weather boat ramp, improving docks and harbours or helping to upgrade a water pipeline to a Native owned ice plant. Other projects enhance industrial or commercial opportunities, such as industrial parks in Port Alice and Digby Island in Prince Rupert, or assistance in creating an Economic Development Zone on Quinsam Indian Reserve 12 in Campbell River. The Central Coast RSC voted to contribute \$302,500 towards a project that will provide Broadband Internet to the communities on the Central Coast, and the Mount Waddington and Comox Strathcona RSCs have also approved funding to assist in the installation of Broadband Internet in six Northern Vancouver Island communities. In aggregate, 24.2% of CST funding has gone to assist infrastructure related projects.

A third focus is shellfish aquaculture and processing. The Comox Strathcona and Mount Waddington Regional Steering Committees jointly elected to help fund a Shellfish Industry Investment Attraction Initiative promoted by the Vancouver Island Economic Developers Association (VIEDA). They recently expanded funding to assist in attracting investment for shellfish processing. The Central Coast, North Coast and Queen Charlotte Islands/ Haida Gwaii RSCs jointly agreed to support a combined North Coast – Skeena First Nations Stewardship Society and Turning Points Initiative Society application for assistance in developing a coast wide shellfish aquaculture initiative. The Central Coast RSC has also provided support to the Heiltsuk Nation Shellfish Co-operative. In aggregate, 14.1% of CST funding has gone to assist aquaculture and processing related projects.

The CST also supports the development of non timber forest products. In Northern Vancouver Island this has taken the form of a Non-Timber Forest Products Innovation Centre, while the Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii RSC approved funding to a Co-op that will initially pursue vacuum drying of chanterelle mushrooms, and later branch into other edible products.

To date, CST funding has been fairly evenly split, with 51% of funding going to First Nations sponsored initiatives, and 49% going to civic community sponsored initiatives. In fact, a significant number of initiatives related to shellfish aquaculture, tourism, planning and broadband were joint initiatives between First Nations and civic communities.

Ecosystem Based Management - Land Use Planning Account

In the second quarter of 2003 a donor directed trust of \$254,000 was added to the CST. It is restricted to providing assistance for land use planning related to EBM. To date, the CST has received five funding requests, totaling \$234,188. Four were approved, for a total commitment of \$194,188. As of September 30, 2006, \$189,888 has been disbursed.

The projects relate to helping the Nuxalk Nation join the LRMP process, helping the Turning Point Initiative work out a framework agreement for government-to-government negotiations, doing an EBM related study in Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii, and performing a timber supply and ecological risk analysis, also on Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii.

Economic, Scientific and Adaptive Management Development and Planning Sub Trust (ESAMDAP)

In the second quarter of 2004 a donor directed trust of \$145,000 was added to the CST. It is restricted to providing assistance with Economic, Scientific and Adaptive Management Development and

Planning. To date the CST had received and approved four applications for a total commitment of \$132,486. As of December 31, 2006, \$65,300 has been disbursed. One project involves a Use, Recreation and Enjoyment by the Public Review in North and Central Vancouver Island,. Another involves an Environmental Assessment of the Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii Land Use Plan Options. A third funded 7 residents in Queen Charlotte Islands/Haida Gwaii to attend a seminar titled Leadership in Community Economic Transition, and the final project will assist in the development of a joint Nuxalk Nation and Bella Coola Resource Society EBM related business plan for their community forest tenures.

Upcoming termination of the Coast Sustainability Trust and the creation of a new trust

The Trust Deed that created the Coast Sustainability Trust stipulates that the CST is to terminate on March 31, 2007, and that the Trustee then has two years to determine what to do with any remaining funds in the CST. In anticipation of the termination of the CST, all the Advisory Board and Regional Steering Committee members, as well as all First Nations, organized communities and Regional Districts that are potential beneficiaries of the CST were asked to comment on the disposition of remaining CST funds. The unanimous response was that the CST should be rolled over into a new trust that mirrors the existing trust, with only a few suggestions for minor changes.

In an Advisory Board meeting held on December 14, 2006 the board agreed that any funds remaining in the CST on March 31, 2007, and any outstanding commitments of the CST, should be rolled over into a new trust, to be called Coast Sustainability Trust II, (CST II) and that the new trust should operate in essentially the same way as the current CST. The CST Trustee and Advisory Board would be retained by the new trust, as would each of the five Regional Steering Committees. The main differences would be that the Regional Steering Committees would have the ability to increase the CST commitment to any one project to as much as \$250,000 instead of the current \$100,000 maximum and, in order to help small communities, the CST II could contribute up to 75% of the first \$50,000 in a project's cost, instead of the current 50/50 requirement for all community matching fund projects.

Looking Ahead

During the first quarter of 2007, I expect the following activity:

- CST II will be created in anticipation of CST funds and existing commitments being transferred into it effective April 1, 2007;
- The HG-QCI-RSC will work to develop regional economic development priorities.
- Funding requests will continue to be received and evaluated by each of the five Regional Steering Committees.
- Funding Agreements for Community Matching Fund projects will continue to be signed in the five RSC areas, and further disbursements will be made.
- The current EBM Land Use Planning Subtrust and Economic, Scientific and Adaptive Management Development and Planning Subtrusts will be combined into a new EBM Working group subtrust, and that subtrust will be rolled into the CST II.
